# CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Dear Parish Electors,

This is my 1<sup>st</sup> Newsletter report and it is my pleasure to be able to talk about some of the highlights and challenges the Parish Council have encountered in the last 12 months. The Parish Council meet every 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday of every month, they are open meetings, everyone is welcome to join us. The agendas are posted on the notice boards around the village and there is also a website for Dunham Massey Parish Council hosted by Trafford Council, where the agenda and minutes of the meetings can be found. The meetings are the best place to keep up to date with matters arising, or for issues to be discussed, so please come and join us.

We continue to work closely with our local Trafford Councillors – Karen Barclay, Michael Hyman and Sean Anstee, who continue to attend our meetings on a regular basis, providing us with advice and support with issues that are raised.

Our relationship with the National Trust continues to grow from strength to strength and they continue to play a key role across the parish and have supported the Parish Council and the village on a whole in many ways this year including a fabulous evening in the garden which was enjoyed by all those that attended and for which we are very grateful.

There are still the usual ongoing challenges of pot holes, fly tipping, flooding, verges, leaves on pavements, all of which can be reported to Amey -the company that provide the infrastructure for Trafford-online at My Trafford and we encourage you to do this, the more reporting the better!

The greatest success this year is the installation of superfast broadband, and hopefully by the time you are reading this it will have been switched on. James Bushell reported in the last newsletter about the challenges of bringing high speed broadband to the village, and following on from the work that was put into the project over the last few years, a subgroup was set up to find the best provider. The procurement process was very time consuming and lengthy for all involved, but we feel that the best company for the job was found. The process that DMPC and Warburton PC have gone through to secure the contract has also helped in other local areas that experienced poor speeds. I'm certainly looking forward to experiencing faster download speeds and the myth that is Netflix!

With thanks to the National Trust's support, we have been able to change the Clearway signs along Charcoal Road. After a few false starts with the signs, it appears that we are finally starting to win the parking war. We are aware that there are some areas of the village that are suffering with bad parking in front of their homes, and we continue to try to come up with a solution for this. It was positive that a plan of action was decided to combat problem parkers whether it involved 101 for those whose access is blocked or the emergency traffic wardens, and its great to see so many people willing to pick up the phone on a clear day to combat a major issue.

There are still some big issues that plague us, such as speeding and I'm sure some of you will have noticed that our "smiley sign" has not been in much use recently. The reason for this is that we are restricted to positioning and are awaiting confirmation of where it can be placed. We are not allowed to hang it on any lampposts or sign posts, we are being provided a pole for it to be mounted onto, however we have been told that we cannot position the pole on Council land. As you can imagine this is quite a challenge – please let us know if you feel that you may be able to help us overcome this challenge and have the perfect position for it to be displayed, until then we shall continue to work with our Trafford Councillors to be able to identify the right positioning.

We also have a challenge on Woodhouse Lane where the road narrows past the houses on the bad bend. The residents are currently working with us and the Trafford Councillors to come up with a solution to improve safety for both pedestrians and drivers following a couple of nasty incidents which have occurred on the road in the last couple of months. It is an issue that I'm sure everyone that has ever driven along that stretch of road will appreciate, but its most frustrating for the residents in the houses, and we will do everything we can to continue to support them and ensure that a solution is reached.

Not organised via DMPC but big thanks to all those that have been given up their time and have been out litter picking and helping Dunham stay looking beautiful. This extends to those that have joined in on the WhatsApp arranged days or those that simply do it as part of their daily routine. Everyone in the village appreciates the work and time that is put into it.

And last, but certainly not least, a huge thank you to Tracy Carr for following in the WI's footsteps and organising the Millennium Flower bed planting and maintenance. Tracey and her team worked so hard and the flower bed looked absolutely stunning.

A special mention and thank you to the National Trust for the donation of a huge amount of plants and flowers, it was a great honour to be able to display them in the flower bed.

## **Council Meetings**

Council Meetings are held on the 2nd Tuesday of every month (except August) at 8pm in the small meeting room at Dunham Massey Village Hall (use the side door for entry). All residents are welcome. There is a regular item in the agenda for residents to raise any issues with the Council for consideration. If you would like to raise an issue or have a query, please also contact The Clerk or any Councillor who can support your query.

## **What is the Parish Council?**

Your council is a corporate body, a legal entity separate from that of its members. Its decisions are the responsibility of the whole body. The council has been granted powers by Parliament including the important authority to raise money through taxation (the precept) and a range of powers to spend public money.

Your council is an elected body in the first tier of local government. Local councils have the legal power to take action, but they have very few duties and great freedom to choose what action to take. The Parish Council can influence other decision makers and help to deliver services to meet local needs.

# What powers and duties does the Parish Council have?

Parish councils have a variety of powers and duties, all of which impact directly on the community.

**The following lists items which fall under the remit of local councils in general. In some cases the duties have been taken on by Trafford MBC, but in all cases the Parish Council is there to help your voice be heard:**

· Allotments
· Burial Grounds, Cemeteries, Churchyards and Crematoria
· Bus Shelters
· Bye-laws – the power to make bye-laws concerning: baths and washhouses (swimming pools), cycle parks, mortuaries and pleasure grounds
· Clocks – public clocks can be provided and must be maintained
· Community Centres, Conference Centres, Halls, Public Buildings
· Drainage – of ditches and ponds
· Entertainment and the Arts
· Footpaths
· General Spending – parish councils can spend a limited amount of money on anything they deem of benefit to the community that is not covered by the other specific responsibilities described in this list
· Gifts – parish councils may accept gifts
· Highways – lighting, parking places, right to enter into discussions about new roads and road widening, consent of parish council required for diversion or discontinuation of highway, traffic signs and other notices, tree planting and verge maintenance
· Land – acquisition and sale of
· Legal proceedings – power to prosecute and defend any legal proceedings in the interests of the community, power to take part in any public enquiry
· Litter - provision of litter-bins and support for any anti-litter campaigns
· Planning – parish councils must be notified of, and display for residents, any planning applications for the area. Any comments submitted to the planning authority by the parish council must be taken into account
· Postal and Telecommunication Facilities – power to pay a public telecommunications operator any loss sustained in providing services in that area
· Public conveniences – provision and maintenance of public toilets

· Recreation – provision of recreation grounds, public walkways, pleasure grounds, open spaces, village greens, gymnasiums, playing fields, holiday camps and boating ponds
· Rights of Way – footpath and bridleway maintenance
· Seats (public)
· Signs – danger signs, place names and bus stops signs
· Tourism – financial contributions to any local tourist organisations allowed
· Traffic Calming
· War Memorials
· Water Supply – power to utilise stream, well or spring water and to provide facilities for general use

## Community Grants

The Parish Council has a small grants scheme which offers grants to recognised “not for profit” community groups. Applications can be made for any purpose which will be of clear benefit to residents of Dunham Massey. Applications for grants should be made using the application form which can be obtained from the Clerk.

Grants are also available from the Manchester Airport Community Trust Fund. The Trust will support eligible charitable projects that have a community, social or environmental focus. # Planning

The Parish Council receives and comments on planning and licensing applications which have been submitted to Trafford Council for developments within the area. These include house extensions, diversification of farms, change of use of buildings, and any development which will impact on residents or the environment.

The Parish Council will always object to retrospective planning applications, ie when a construction is started before a planning application is submitted. This procedure is time-consuming and wearisome for both applicant and Council.

Details of all Planning Applications can be found on the Trafford Council website. A weekly list is issued and can be found at <https://tinyurl.com/traffordplanninglist>. This is also publicised in local newspapers. Comments on particular Planning Applications should be sent to the Trafford Planning Department, however you are always welcome to discuss the application in person at any Parish Council Meeting.

# Highway Issues

Highway repairs and maintenance is carried out by Amey on behalf of Trafford. The Trafford website has a large "Report It" section where issues can be reported. Navigate to the sections dealing with highways issues, and follow the instructions. You will be given a reference number for each reported issue. If you email a copy of this to the Clerk then we will be able to follow up with Amey and Trafford if necessary.

# **DUNHAM WATCH**

Dunham Watch is a WhatsApp group set up in 2015 as an alternative to traditional neighbourhood watch meetings and is to be used only for urgent crime or safety related messages. Due to the geographical size of Dunham and the number of people living here it is the fastest means of spreading alerts if there are any suspicious or concerning incidents in the village. The WhatsApp members can also call for help if needed. The group currently has 113 members and membership is open to anyone living in the village so we would love to hear from you.

All you need is a mobile phone that will run the WhatsApp app.

There are also weekly police email reports that are forwarded to members regarding burglaries in the Altrincham area.

# **DUNHAM LIFE**

With 96 members Dunham Life is the social offspring of Dunham Watch. It is a separate WhatsApp group which was created because users of Dunham Watch liked having the ability to reach villagers with information quickly and easily, but wanted to avoid diluting the impact of the Watch messages which are for more serious matters.

Dunham Life allows users to distribute news about the more social aspects of village life, such as events in the village hall, pubs etc. and general questions such as where to find a gardener etc.

# DUNHAM LOST AND FOUND

As the name implies, this WhatsApp group is to help find anything missing in the village; missing pets is the most popular category. It was set up by members of Dunham Life and Watch, and with 66 members across the village has been enormously successful in reuniting pets with their owners.

As an organisation, the Rose Queen committee not only co-ordinates the day, but also runs a programme of social and charity events throughout the year for both adults and children.


On 24<sup>th</sup> March there is a Band Night for the adults and throughout the year we have a number of very popular childrens' discos.

# LAWN TENNIS CLUB

The Dunham Massey Lawn Tennis Club is situated at the junction of Charcoal Road and Woodhouse Lane. The club is open to all residents of Dunham Massey. We also welcome members of other tennis clubs who would like to come and try playing on grass.



The Tennis Club was founded in 1920 by servicemen returning from World War I who wanted to provide recreational facilities for Dunham Massey residents. In a demonstration of personal commitment, which has been mirrored by members throughout the Club's history, these men cleared a copse, dug out roots, and levelled and seeded the land in order to create two grass courts.

The first net posts were funded by the Army Canteen Fund, and the net donated by Lord Stamford - the owner of Dunham Massey. But it was not until 1939 that the Club got its first pavilion, again built by its members.

A regular social tennis night is held every Wednesday throughout the summer (weather permitting of course).
